10. (Vallejo Yacht Club - Application for Lease of Tide and Submerged Lands in Mare Island Strait, Solano County, for Temporary Berthing of Boats - W.O. 463, P.R.C. 411) The Commission was informed that the Vallejo Yacht Club, Inc., has applied for a year by year lease of approximately two and one-half acres of tide and submerged lands in Mare Island Strait outside of and adjoining the pierhead line for temporary berthing of small craft pending dredging of the Vallejo Harbor. It is planned to install a floating dock with mooring buoys to be entirely removed upon completion of dredging.

Upon motion duly made and unanimously carried, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Executive Officer to issue a year by year lease to Vallejo Tacht Club, Inc., for approximately two and one-half acres of tide and submerged lands in Mare Island Strait, Solano County, outside of and adjacent to the pierhead line at an annual rental of \$50,00, lease to issue upon receipt of the \$5.00 filing fee, expense deposit of \$25.00, and first annual rental.

11. (Pacific Cas and Electric Company - Application for Right of Way Easement - Sacramento River - Rio Vista, Sacramento County - W.O. 426, P.R.C. 191) The Commission was advised that on July 30, 1945 preliminary permit was granted to the Pacific Cas and Electric Company to construct an electric transmission line over Sacramento River at Rio Vista, Sacramento County. On June 26, 1946 this preliminary approval was rescinded.

The Pacific Gas and Electric Company has again applied for a right of way easement 100 feet in width and 1800 feet in length, to be used for the installation, construction, maintenance and use of electric transmission and telephone lines suspended from poles erected on dolphins and extending across Sacramento River at Rio Vista, Sacramento County.

Upon motion duly made and unanimously carried, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Executive Officer to issue to Pacific Gas and Electric Company a right of way easement 100 feet in width and 1850 feet in length across the Sacramento River at Rio Vista, Sacramento County, for the installation, construction, maintrance and use of electric transmission and telephone lines suspended from poles erected on dolphins, upon approval by the Corps of Engineers, for a period of fifteen years at an annual rental of \$76.00, together with right of renewal for two additional periods of ten years each at such terms as may be agreed upon at time of renewal. A \$5,000.00 performance bond to be required, which bond, at applicants option, may be included in the \$50,000.00 blanket bond here-tofore furnished the State.

12. (Standard Pipe Line Company - Application for Lease of Tide and Submerged Lands in Estero Bay, San Luis Obispo County - W.O. hOl, P.R.C. hl8) The Commission was informed that on February 25, 1949 it authorized the Executive Officer to issue a right of way easement in Estero Bay, San Luis Obispo County, to Standard Pipe Line Company, consisting of two parcels, 560 feet and 750 feet in length, each 100 feet in width, at an annual rental of \$65.68. Standard Pipe Line Company has now requested that this lease be modified to include only one of these parcels, 560 feet in length and 100 feet in width to be used for the installation and maintenance of an anode line for protection of a submarine loading line.

Upon motion duly made and unanimously carried, a resolution was adopted rescinding the action of February 25, 1949, Minute Item 16, Page 926, and authorizing the Executive Officer to issue a right of way easement 560 feet in length and 100 feet in width over tide and submerged lands in Estero Bay, San Luis Obispo County, to Standard Pipe Line Company for the installation and maintenance of an anode line for cathodic protection of their submarine loading line for a period of fifteen years at an annual rental of \$50.20 with the right of renewal for an additional period of ten years at such terms as shall be determined at time of renewal. Easement to issue upon receipt of bond in the amount of \$1,000.00 and the first and last annual rentals.

13. (Standard Oil Company of California - Application for Right of Way Easement over Tide and Submerged Lands in Estero Bay, San Luis Chispo County - W.O. 508, P.R.C. 413) The Commission was informed that the Standard Oil Company had applied for a right of way easement 750 feet in length and 100 feet in width over tide and submerged lands in Estero Bay, San Luis Obispo County, for the installation and maintenance of an anode line for cathodic protection of one of their submarine loading lines.

Upon motion duly made and unanimously carried, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Executive Officer to issue a right of way easement 750 feet in length and 100 feet in width to Standard Oil Company of California over tide and submerged lands in Estero Bay, San Luis Obispo County, for the installation and maintenance of an anode line for cathodic protection of submarine loading lines for a period of fifteen years at an annual rental of \$55.00 with right of renewal for an additional period of ten years at such terms as shall be determined at time of renewal. Pasement to issue upon receipt of bond in the amount of \$1,000.00 and the first and last annual rentals.

the (Bid of Del Monte Properties Company for Lease to Extract Sand at Moss Beach, Spanish Bay - Monterey County - W.O. 359, P.R.C. 414) The Commission was informed that pursuant to published Notice of Intention to Receive Bids for a mineral extraction lease on State tidelands in Spanish Bay near Asilomar Beach, Monterey County, as authorized by the Commission February 25, 1949, Minute Page 927, one bid has been received from the Del Monte Properties Company offering a royalty in the sum of three cents per ton for all sand and gravel extracted.

Upon motion duly made and unanimously carried, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Executive Officer to execute and issue to the Del Monte Properties dompany a mineral extraction lease for an initial term of five years on tideland between the ordinary high water and ordinary low water marks of the Pacific Ocean extending from the property known as Asilomar on the north to the Bathing Pavillion adjoining the Seventeen Mile Drive on the south, for the extraction of not to exceed 100,000 tons of sand and gravel per year, subject to cancellation upon six months, notice should accurate surveys by the State determine that the removal of sand and gravel is unreasonably interfering with the maintenance and use of beaches in the area, the royalty payments under the lease to be three cents per ton for all sand and gravel extracted. The lease is to provide for optional renewal for three additional five year periods at the same terms.
