**AMENDMENT OF PUBLIC AGENCY PERMIT AND
RIGHT OF WAY MAP**

PERMITTEE/APPLICANT:

California Department of Transportation
1352 West Olive Drive
Fresno, California 93778

CURRENT AREA, TYPE LAND AND LOCATION:

A 1.36, acre parcel, more or less, of State owned sovereign land located in the San Joaquin River, near the City of Fresno, Fresno and Madera Counties.

CURRENT LAND USE:

Highway purposes pursuant to Section 101.5 of the Streets and Highways Code, specifically the continued use and occupation of State lands underlying an existing bridge crossing the San Joaquin River on Route 41.

CURRENT PERMIT TERM:

Indefinite period from January 1, 1986.

CURRENT CONSIDERATION:

As set forth by Section 101.5, Streets and Highways Code and the public use and benefit.

TERMS OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT:

Amend the current Permit description to include an additional 6.93 acres, more or less, of State owned sovereign lands required for the construction and maintenance of two sets of bridges and necessary appurtenant facilities on Route 41 crossing the San Joaquin River.

OTHER PERTINENT INFORMATION:

1. At its meeting of February 27, 1986, Minute Item 4, the Commission authorized issuance of a Public Agency Permit and Right-of-Way Map pursuant to section 101.5 of the Streets and Highways Code to the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) for an indefinite period of time for an existing bridge crossing the San Joaquin River on Route 41.
2. Caltrans proposes to construct a four-lane freeway within the adopted alignment of Route 41. As a part of this project, Caltrans proposes to construct two sets of parallel bridges adjacent to the existing Route 41 bridges. The existing Route 41 bridges will remain in place and will provide access to residential and commercial properties in the San Joaquin River Valley floor.
3. California Assembly Bill 3121 (Chapter 1025, Statute of 1990) set forth general goals for the development of a linear park along the San Joaquin River from Friant Dam to Highway 99. Ownership and management of the proposed parkway has not yet been determined. Caltrans coordinated with the San Joaquin Valley Parkway Task Force to ensure that access from the river valley floor to the Route 41 frontage road is wide enough to accommodate pedestrian, equestrian, and bicycle traffic across the Route 41 right-of-way. The Legislature enacted Chapter 1012, Statute of 1992 enabling the San Joaquin River Conservancy to implement the Task Force Plan.

4. Based on the information provided, staff has determined that the proposed bridges will not significantly interfere with the public trust needs and uses between the ordinary high water marks.
5. A Negative Declaration was prepared and adopted for this project by The California Department of Transportation and the Federal Highway Administration. The State Lands Commission's staff has reviewed the document.
6. This activity involves lands identified as possessing significant environmental values pursuant to Public Resources Code Sections 6370, et seq. Based upon the staff's consultation with the persons nominating such lands and through the CEQA review process, it is the staff's opinion that the project, as proposed, is consistent with its use classification.
7. A Mitigation Monitoring Plan was adopted by the California Department of Transportation.

State Lands Commission, State Reclamation Board, Corps of Engineers, Department of Fish and Game, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the California Regional Water Quality Control Board.



IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE COMMISSION:

1. FIND THAT A NEGATIVE DECLARATION AND A MITIGATION MONITORING PLAN WERE PREPARED AND ADOPTED FOR THIS PROJECT BY THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION AND THE FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION AND THAT THE COMMISSION HAS REVIEWED AND CONSIDERED THE INFORMATION CONTAINED THEREIN.
2. FIND THAT THIS ACTIVITY IS CONSISTENT WITH THE USE CLASSIFICATION DESIGNATED FOR THE LAND PURSUANT TO PUBLIC RESOURCES CODE SECTIONS 6370, ET SEQ.
3. APPROVE THE MAP FILED BY THE CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION PURSUANT TO SECTION 101.5 OF THE STREETS AND HIGHWAYS CODE, AS SHOWN ON EXHIBIT "A" ATTACHED AND BY REFERENCE MADE A PART HEREOF.
4. AUTHORIZE THE AMENDMENT OF A CONTINUOUS PUBLIC AGENCY PERMIT AND RIGHT-OF-WAY MAP PERMIT NO. PRC 6945.9, EFFECTIVE AUGUST 1, 1996, TO ADD TWO SETS OF BRIDGE CROSSINGS OF THE SAN JOAQUIN RIVER, MORE PARTICULARLY DESCRIBED IN EXHIBIT "B" ATTACHED HERETO; AND FIND THAT THE PROPOSED BRIDGES WILL NOT SIGNIFICANTLY INTERFERE WITH THE PUBLIC TRUST NEEDS AND USES BETWEEN THE ORDINARY HIGH WATER MARKS OF THE SAN JOAQUIN RIVER; ALL OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF PERMIT NO. PRC 6945.9 REMAIN IN FULL FORCE AND EFFECT. SUCH PERMITTED ACTIVITY IS CONTINGENT UPON PERMITTEE'S COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE PERMITS, RECOMMENDATIONS, OR LIMITATIONS ISSUED BY FEDERAL, STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT AGENCIES.





NEGATIVE DECLARATION

State Highway Route 41 North Freeway Project Between Friant Road in Fresno County and 0.5 Kilometer (0.3 mile) north of Avenue 12 in Madera County

Prepared pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (Division 13 of the Public Resources Code).

Project Description. The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) proposes to construct a four-lane freeway within the adopted alignment of Route 41 from Audubon Drive in Fresno County to Avenue 11 in Madera County. The limits of the project extend from Friant Road in Fresno to 0.5 kilometer (0.3 mile) north of Avenue 12 in Madera County to allow for possible future repaving of the existing Route 41 freeway from Friant Road to Audubon, to provide a safe transition from the proposed freeway back to a two-lane rural highway, and to allow for possible temporary storage areas for project construction equipment and materials.

Determination. An Initial Study has been prepared by Caltrans. On the basis of this study, it has been determined that the proposed project in combination with proposed mitigation measures would not have a significant effect on the environment for the following reasons:


- The project would not increase flood risk in the San Joaquin River floodplain, and would not interrupt or terminate a transportation facility which is needed for emergency vehicles or provides a community's only evacuation route in the event of a flood or other catastrophic event.
- The project would not increase seismic hazards.
- The project would conform to the State Implementation Plan for air quality compliance. There would be no increase in the number or severity of carbon monoxide violations of the State ambient air quality standards.
- The project would result in the removal of 1.02 hectares (2.52 acres) of riparian woodland, 1.68 hectares (4.2 acres) of wetlands, and 0.04 hectare (0.1 acre) of vernal pool habitat. These habitat types support vernal pool fairy shrimp, western spadefoot toad, and valley elderberry longhorn beetle, which are threatened or endangered species. These impacts would be mitigated to a level of insignificance by habitat replacement in kind.
- The project would displace 5 habitable single-family residences and 4 commercial buildings containing 7 businesses. There are sufficient vacant commercial and residential lots within the neighborhood affected by the project for all displaced businesses and residents to relocate in the neighborhood. These relocations would be accomplished under the Relocation Assistance Program. Therefore, relocation impacts would not be significant.

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- The project would result in noise approaching or exceeding 67 dBA at Woodward Regional Park and Bird Sanctuary and the Woodward Bluffs Mobile Home Estates. These impacts would be mitigated to a level of insignificance by the installation of sound barriers.
- The relative proximity of the project to Woodward Regional Park and Bird Sanctuary would not impair the protected activities, features, or attributes that qualify the Park for protection under Section 4(f) of the Transportation Act (23 CFR 771.135[p][2] to [5]).
- The project would have no impact on cultural resources that are on or eligible for the National Record of Historic Places.
