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

CHAIRPERSON CORY:

We'll call the meeting to

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order. ÷., 4 €. Are there any corrections or additions to the 5 Minutes? б COMMISSIONER MORGAN: NO. 7 COMMISSIONER ACKERMAN: No. 8 CHAIRPERSON CORY: Without objection, be 9 confirmed as presented. 10 First we have a report of the Executive Officar. 11 EXECUTIVE OFFICER DEDRICK: Yes, I have a short 12 report today. 13 We've granted a Letter of Permission to Pacific 14 Telephone in advance of a foutine permit to enter 15 submerged land in Walker Creek, Marin County, to relocate 16 a telephone conduit 85 feet west of where it is. 17 Do you want any more detail on that? 18 CHAIRPERSON CORY: No, that's probably more than 19 we needed. 20 EXECUTIVE OFFICER DEDRICK: I thought so. 21 More importantly, we've been 16 bking, as you know, 22 for quite a long time on engineering salaries. And Jim met 23 with the Department of Personnel Administration staff 24 people last week and presented our proposal for salary 25

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realignment for the classes.

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This represents an increase of six hundred to 2 nine hundred for our engineering classes, equating then 3 with the level of the Department of Oil Properties in 4 Long Beach. 5

This level, if approved, would be a very vast improvement in the morale situation of our people down there, who are making 22 percent less than the people they are) overseeing at the Departmen ____Oil Properties.

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We've asked DPA to meet face-to-face with our 10 staff people and to allow them to express --11

EXECUTIVE OFFICER DEDRICK: You know, this is that -- they're going to drop it on that natural seep off Santa Barbara as an air pollution trade-off for their drilling activities. It's really a very --

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EXECUTIVE OFFICER DEDRICK: When are they going
to install this thing, Don?

| 6 | EXECUTIVE OFFICER DEDRICK: They've invited Don |

| 10 | They've got about six and a half million dollars in the |
| 11 | project. I don't think it will ever pay out. It's about |
| 12 | ten barres a day maximum. |
| 13 | CHAIRPERSON CORY: And what royalty are we getting |
| 14 | on that? |
| 15 | EXECUTIVE OFFICER DEDRICK: That's a good question. |
| 16 | Do they have a lease? |

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1 and they've moved in on location with the drilling vessel, 2 which is the first drilling dong from anything except from 3 a fixed platform, existing facility, since the oil spill in 4 1968 or '69.

And the reason I was mentioning the helicopter contract was just coincidentally today we're having an oil spill drill on the ship in conjunction with the Coastal Commission and the Coast Guard and the Department of Fish and Game. And our helicopter is taking part in the activity. We'll be doing air observations from it.

And I'm just -- that's a pitch when we get to the helicopter contract.

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CHAIRPERSON CORY: Okay.

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We have a report, Dwight, on coastal matters. Yes, Mr. Chairman, members. MR. SANDERS: 2 On Wednesday, May 19th of this year, the Coastal 3 Commission had, as part of its meeting, a public hearing to 4 assist them in developing their comments -- or at least 5 their staff comments -- on the Program Environmental Impact 6 Report that covers the Commission's proposed lease from 7 Point Conception and Point Arguello. 8

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The hearing lasted approximately an hour, in 9 which ten individuals testified on the document, eight of 40 which had testified at one or both of the two previous 11 hearings that the Commission staff had held in Santa Barbara. 12

The issues discussed ranged from oil spill 13 contingency planning to effects on sea otters and so forth, 14 15 the full range.

The Coastal Commission staff has developed comments 16 on the document. And those will be considered in conjunction 17 with transcripus from the public hearing at their meeting of June 4th in San Francisco. We will be in attendance to answer any questions or assist them in any manner.

The comments will then be addressed in the 21 Final Environmental Impact Report that will be prepared by 22 the Commission for your certification. 23

EXECUTIVE OFFICER DEDRICK: I should tell you --24 report back to you on the two hearings which I conducted 25

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directly on our EIR, both held in Santa Barbara. To my great surprise, there was not a great deal of testimony. There were 17 people at the first hearing, which was held in an afternoon and an evening; and 19 at the second hearing, which was held on a Saturday. These preceded the Coastal Commission hearings that Dwight was just talking about.

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8 As you recall, I asked if you would extend the 9 commenting period and have two hearings, which you did. 10 That was extremely well received by the people there. There 11 were many comments from individuals in local government 12 thanking the Commission for extending the time and giving 13 people a chance to testify.

The close of overything is June 7th. And then
Dwight has to sit down and incorporate everybody's comments.
We have not yet received any official comments, of course,
from the state agencies.
